## 19th Century Bronze Statue by Francois Theodore Devaulx

Bronze statue of a semi-naked woman with grapes by François Théodore Devaulx.

The figure of a lady is shown to be holding up a bunch of grapes in her left hand, scantily dressed except for some drapery around her, and standing on a naturalistic base with her left leg raised up and her foot pointing downwards.

Signed also with Paris Foundry mark, François Théodore Devaulx, or Théodore-François Devaulx, o (September 15, 1808 – January 21, 1871) was a French sculptor. In 1823, Devaulx was a student of Jules Ramey (1796 – 1852) at the Ecole des beaux-arts de Paris. He received the second prize at the Prix de Rome in 1833.

François participated in the Salon des artistes Français, of which he was a member, from 1845 to 1870. He received a third-class medal at the Paris Salon in 1849. He is buried in the Pere Lachaise Cemetery 36th division.
